





Outdoor Amenity Rehoming & Mapping Progress has started!

- Our team leaders are: Melody Alcazar, Yasmine Anderson, and Mandi Golman
- Our goals are:

1. Map all the outdoor amenities in order to track them for reuse and activation. (*Initial focus on the 2022 Bond Modernization schools*).

- 2. Recover outdoor features in good condition that can be reused
- 3. Prevent throwing away items to the landfill
- 4. Save funds by reusing items instead of buying them new
- Update:
 - Mandi Golman started a SOP for AISD to recover items and is meeting with Project Managers on bond sites to create a process for rehoming them.
 - Currently scrubbing data, then will analyze. Will develop summary letter for Board/Superintendent this winter.







Zero Waste

Team Leader: Lavanya Selvam Alli

Long Term Goal: To establish practices that will meet AISD and the City of Austin's zero waste goal to re-circularize (e.g. recycle, compost, share) over 90% of our surplus and waste by 2040.

Creation of Cafeteria Sustainability Initiative

An initiative across AISD schools to increase awareness among students, teachers and parents/caregivers about best zero waste practices.

- **Resources:** Use successful initiatives (Blanton, Marshall, Lasa) to replicate models across AISD through the support of external partners (Keep Austin Beautiful, Parents Climate Community and Plastic Reduction Project)
- Next Steps:
 - Reach out to schools with existing green teams and those in the process of creating one to start the conversations
 - Create or redesign new posters and templates (appealing for students) that uses similar language as Austin Resource and Recycling to ensure consistency on zero waste practices
 - Reviewing Standard Operating Procedures with the Custodial Leadership team at AISD
 - Reach out to PTA boards across AISD to gauge engagement and awareness among parents/caregivers

AISD Stadiums

An initiative to getting zero waste practises established at AISD athletic facilities

- **Resources:** Conduct audits of these facilities to understand current practices
- Next Steps: Review the work that has already been done by members of this working group and update information







Energy Engagement

Goal: Engage students in energy related projects in Austin and at Austin ISD.



- Tamera Tate, ESAC member and Austin Energy Education Outreach Coordinator, recently completed outreach at Pecan Springs through the <u>Austin Energy School Outreach Program</u>. Last year, the Educational Outreach Team did 58 AISD presentations.
- Currently exploring other partnerships to support green energy career pathways and internships.
- Host a summer intern in the green energy sector! Local businesses can offer 10-12th grade AISD students work experience, skills, and mentorship through a partnership with the Austin Ed Fund and Austin Chamber of Commerce. While energy-related businesses are ideal, all companies are welcome. Last summer, 36 students from 7 high schools participated. The Chamber will help onboard hosts. Next Steps: Focusing priorities to get additional guidance from Luke on what is achievable





WHAT IS RECAPTURE?

Recapture is part of the Texas school funding system. It requires districts with high property wealth to pay a portion of what they collect to the state.

The system was created 30 years ago as a way to ensure equal funding for Texas districts. Recapture has grown much faster than public school funding, so vastly more is collected than is needed to equalize funding. That reduces the share of state funds used to pay for public education. It also creates a burden for taxpayers in recapture districts.

RECAPTURE IN AUSTIN ISD

Austin ISD is the state's largest recapture payer, contributing more than the next several districts combined.

In the past, we have paid as much as \$940M and as much as 57% of our total tax collections. Last year, we paid \$660M. With the passage of Prop A, our recapture rate will go from about 49% to about 51%.

General Fund: Tax Collections v Recapture




Note : During the 88th Texas Legislative session, SB2 was passed to increase residence homestead property tax exemption; therefore decreasing Austin ISD's tax collections as well as Recapture.

RECAPTURE IN AUSTIN ISD

Austin ISD has an online property tax calculator that shows you exactly how much you pay in recapture, if you pay property tax.

It also shows where the rest of our funding goes. About 87% of all spending goes to paying the people who serve our students and support our schools.



WHO ELSE PAYS **RECAPTURE?**

Austin ISD is the state's largest recapture payer, contributing more than the next several districts combined.

In the past, we have paid as much as \$940M and as much as 57% of our total tax collections. Last year, we paid \$660M. With the passage of Prop A, our recapture rate will go from about 49% to about 51%.

Some districts pay a far larger share especially in resort areas and areas that extract or refine oil and gas.

WHAT RECAPTURE IS NOT

- Austin ISD does not have less money because of recapture.
- Recapture does mean that AISD taxpayers pay more for the school funding we have.
- Under Texas school funding formulas, all Texas districts get a similar amount of perstudent funding - a figure that's set by the state legislature. That figure is effectively a cap on the funds we are allowed to have.
- We could end recapture tomorrow and not have another dollar to spend in our schools.


Figure 8. District Tax Revenue

Figure 8 below presents the district tax revenue for the 2022-23 school year for the District, the peer district average, and the state average.

The District receives \$13,802 in total revenue per student, which higher than both their peers and the state, primarily due to the higher yield for golden pennies the district receives.

PER-STUDENT FUNDING

Recapture does not impact Austin ISD's per-student funding. That's because every district in Texas has roughly the same per-student revenue determined by a statewide funding formula controlled by the Texas Legislature.



HOW DOES PROPA FIT INTO THIS?

Prop A allows us to have the most funding that Texas law allows. Voters approved using copper pennies - an increase in our local propery tax that's subject to recapture. We get more funds to spend in our schools - about \$550 more per student. But we also pay more recapture.

WHAT CAN WE DO?

Austin ISD's board is in charge of making the best use we can of the funds we have available.,

The Texas Legislature determines how much funding Texas public schools have. The budget they pass and the laws they create determine how schools are funded in Texas, how much schools receive, and how some of those funds must be used.

Learn how funding works

Understanding the basics of how funding works and where decisions are made are key to effective advocacy.

Understand where Texas stands

Texas ranks near the bottom in per-student funding nationwide, year after year. We can do better.

Share what you know

Communities across Texas value their public schools. Change requires knowledge and action by public school supporters across Texas.

Advocate

5.5 million Texas students are counting on us to use what we know to support our state's public schools.

ADVOCACY IN AUSTIN ISD

The Austin ISD Board of Trustees adopts advocacy priorities before each legislative session. Those priorities always include an emphasis on increasing per-student fudning in our state.

That would reduce recapture by allowing us to keep more of what we collect. And it would also put more funds into our schools.

FAIR FUNDING

- Increase the basic allotment and add a requirement that the basic allotment be adjusted each biennium based on the rate of inflation.
- Require that all recapture dollars be spent on education, ending the practice of the state supplanting its investment in education with recapture dollars.
- Commission a study that identifies the true cost of educating all students, including the cost of complying with state mandates.
- Update the Foundation School Program allotments to reflect the actual costs of programs assocated with each allotment.
- Increase funding for students receiving special education services to cover the actual district costs for providing needed services.
- Fund school districts on the basis of enrollment rather than attendance.

ADVOCACY IN AUSTIN ISD

Each year, our advoacy also includes priorities that are specific to recapture.

RECAPTURE REFORM

- Institute a formula to determine the amount of recapture paid by districts that takes into account the demographics of the student population.
- Commission a study of the impact of recapture on housing affordability.
- Commission a study of the recapture system to examine whether the current operation of the system aligns with the original goals when created in 1993.
- Restore a discount for districts that make early payments.
- Convert two copper pennies to two golden pennies.
