Meeting Notes:

- Former Sims Elementary School campus is part of the district's repurposing process to identify future uses for underutilized sites that are responsive to community needs
 - Background information can be found on the district website >> <u>Site</u> <u>Repurposing | Austin ISD</u>
 - Community has expressed interest in keeping the existing building and finding ways to honor the history and legacy of the school
- Community members toured the facility in October; group activity revealed affordable childcare to be one of the most desired uses
- Cathy McHorse is an early childhood consultant and advocate with over 30 years of experience in and out of the classroom working in this field
- State of childcare in Austin / Travis County:
 - Biggest challenges:
 - Access
 - Affordability
 - Quality
 - Travis County has highest cost for child care in the state, especially for infants and toddlers due to ratios
 - Contributing factors:
 - Labor
 - Facilities (rent, utilities)
 - Materials & food
 - Cost of living

- Expansion of public Pre-K is moving children out of the childcare model
 - Pre-K tuition historically has subsidized infant/toddlers
- Quality costs more!
 - Lower ratio of students to caregiver
 - Qualifications, training and experience of teacher and staff
 - Policies and procedures

- Texas Workforce Commission provides scholarships for child care for children under 13 years old utilizing federal funding (state does not contribute any additional dollars)
 - Payment rates from the state do not match the cost of high quality
 - Subsidy systems is not meeting the needs of the community

- Co-location at Sims:
 - Opportunities
 - Maintain educational purpose
 - Increase child care supply
 - Reduced costs for child care operators
 - Challenges
 - Requires some investment for conversion of space
 - Need clear security plan / background checks if there are additional operations
- Impact of Travis County Prop A?
 - Increase number of contracted slots
 - Expanded child care workforce
 - Option for funding expanded hours (i.e. evenings, weekends)
 - Does not include funding for capital investments
- <u>Todos Juntos</u> (Operator)
 - Todos Juntos Learning Center is a non-profit organization that serves primarily Latino, Spanish-speaking families in Austin and surrounding areas.
 - We use a four-pronged approach to combat intergenerational poverty among Central Texas' parents and children.
 - Adult English as a Second Language (ESL) and workforce readiness
 - Culturally responsive parenting and life skills education
 - High quality early childhood education (ECE)
 - Case management, resource referrals, and access to professional mental health support

- Todos is a no-cost learning center; dependent on fundraising and state funding
- Space is the largest constraint as it is difficult to identify due to high rental costs in Austin area
- Licensing requirements is a contributing factor (amount of square footage required per student), along with costs of inspections
- Staff recruitment/retention is another challenge, especially when requiring higher certification requirements to deliver high quality care
 - Todos is addressing issue by hiring within and providing livable wages and comprehensive health benefits
- Families are competing for seats Lack of access to affordable care can cause barriers for parent to re-enter the workforce

- Questions
 - How would it be feasible to use Sims as a child care space?
 - There is demand for space but challenge is delivering high quality care, which translates to ability to staffing
 - Child care providers that have over 100 students can more afford the central administrative costs
 - Is Todos Juntos open to African-American families?
 - Yes, absolutely, though historically the organization has primarily served native Spanish speaking families, especially in their ESL program
 - Eager to explore ways to expand their outreach
 - Has AISD explored monetizing real estate to subsidize child care?
 - Yes, but we are unable to currently offer more seats due to lack of dedicated space and staffing constraints
 - What uses would complement child care?
 - Pediatric clinic
 - Organizations that support children special needs
 - Senior daycare
 - Workforce development
